

Minister's Letter –

Dear Friends,

It's April and soon all those Easter eggs will have been eaten. During Lent, I glanced through our copy of the "Village Book" and found the following job opportunity *"Seasonal employment for motivated individual. Must have long ears and be able to hop quickly."* Then I recalled last year's story of the Easter egg bonanza on the Orkney Islands. Dan Dafydd mistakenly ordered 80 *cases* of chocolate eggs



instead of just 80 eggs. The Easter eggs outnumbered the population of Sanday. Undismayed, Dan turned his mistake into a game of "guess the number" squares for people to win the chocolate eggs. The money raised was donated to the work of the R.N.L.I whose lifeboat crews risk their own lives to save the lives of others.

The risking of lives to save others spoke to me of the true story of Easter, the real reason for celebration and thanksgiving. Jesus risked everything and gave up everything, dying so that we could truly live. Easter celebrates the cosmic event of Jesus being raised from death and appearing firstly to Mary Magdalene, then His first disciples, and then 500 other people.

The resurrected Jesus brings new life, new hope, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, new courage, determination, new dynamism and new challenge to the frightened little group of His friends who had had been hiding away behind locked doors. A group of ordinary people, blessed by having been with Him in His earthly ministry, they had travelled with Him and seen at first hand the miracles He had performed. They heard the words He spoke, bringing new understanding, the revealing of God's promise and purpose within the Scriptures. They had seen lives changed and hope renewed.

Their own lives had been changed by His presence, and, through His promised gift of the Holy Spirit given to them at Pentecost, the infant Church had been birthed. His first disciples had been equipped for their part in the work of the Kingdom of God. They had been energised, emboldened and empowered to take the Gospel message of the Good News of Jesus beyond the bounds of all that was familiar and safe to them. They followed where the Spirit led and so began the revolution of the Kingdom of God which changed the world.

The Kingdom of God has come, God's renewing of everything is under way. Jesus is alive. No longer confined by human bounds of time and space, He is with us always and wherever we are, whatever disasters and troubles we endure. He knows each of us by name and speaks to us through His Word and by His Spirit, calling *us* into a new and deeper relationship with Him. Let us together joyfully celebrate the glorious and blessed truth of Jesus' resurrection Christ is risen: He is risen indeed.

Alleluia!

The Romans Course is a ten-session programme which helps you study Paul's letter to the Romans.

The course tackles ten big themes found in the book of Romans which are key to understanding the Christian faith:

- Gospel How can we become confident in our faith?
- Sin What's wrong with the world?
- **Salvation** What's so amazing about grace?
- Peace How can we find rest in a stressful world?
- Freedom How can we avoid negative cycles?
- Hope What has God promised?
- Mystery If God is sovereign, what is our role?
- Devotion How can we live full on for God?
- **Community** How can we live together in love?
- Mission How can we be ambitious with the gospel?

MINISTRY AND MISSION FUND CONTRIBUTIONS

Please find attached a 'Thank You' appreciation for your fellowship's gifts to the Ministry and Mission Fund in 2024. I would be grateful if you could display this in your church and include copies, as appropriate, in any newsletters and magazines etc. – either print or electronic.

Last year was somewhat of a challenge as the administration of contributions to denominational funding moved from the wonderful work that the M&M Advocates had undertaken since 2008 to the Synod Office. Any transition involves making some adjustments, but I am hopeful that the process this year will be much smoother than in 2024. Thank you for your church's patience and goodwill as we surfed the changeover.

When I first became involved with M&M back in 2007, initially as a District Treasurer and later as Synod M&M Advocate, M&M Fund contributions made up 86% of the denomination's unrestricted income. In that respect little has changed. In 2023 it amounted to 88%. However, it is a very different picture when the expenditure side of the equation is considered. In 2006 for every £1 that was given to the M&M Fund, 96p was used to pay stipends and all ministry related costs as well as train ministers, CRCWs and lay preachers. However, in 2023 the income was insufficient to even cover the salary costs of the 314 ordained ministers and CRCWs. We live in difficult times. The cost of living squeeze is felt at all levels and in all places.

With that in mind I am profoundly grateful for the continued generosity of the churches in the Eastern Synod who, together and with Synod support, gifted £1,915,802 to the M&M Fund last year.

Thank you for all that you do to help build the Kingdom here as in heaven.

Jammy News 2nd March 2025

We continued to look at the parables in our JAM sessions, this time we looked at the Parable of the Mustard Seed.

This is one of the smallest parables, being only a few sentences long. It can be found in all three Gospels; clearly another well-remembered parable. You can read it in Matthew 13:31-32, Mark 4:30-32 and Luke 13:18-19.

Not only is the parable small, but the seed it is about, is very tiny indeed.

Jesus has been teaching the people, and he wants to let them know what he means by the Kingdom of God; in this parable Jesus is trying to explain this.

Jesus said what is God's Kingdom like? What can I compare it with?

God's Kingdom is like the seed of a mustard plant, a man plants this seed in his garden, the seed grows and becomes a tree, the wild birds build nests in its branches.

So, what is Jesus saying about God's Kingdom?

He uses the example of a mustard seed, a really tiny seed; although it is the smallest seed, it's powerful, it's alive and can grow up to 10 feet tall!

The people in Palestine would have been very familiar with this plant that could grow to a small tree, big enough that birds could nest in its branches.

Jesus wants the disciples to know that God's Kingdom may have small beginnings, but it will grow and, indeed, is growing bigger and bigger. God's Kingdom is wherever there are people who believe in Jesus, worship God and try to live God's way; they have God's love in their hearts, and they're growing in love for God and others. It's a Kingdom of people's hearts, people living in peace and harmony with each other. At JAM, we are very small part of millions of people all over the world. 2.4 billion people are Christian - 30% of all the world population! That's a lot of people, our part in JAM may seem small and insignificant, but we thought about being a light in the world and looked at a photo from NASA (see below) each individual light is tiny, but together they make a huge difference to darkness.

We thought about the small things that we do at JAM to show love to others, we thought about Mother's Day posies, we thought about running a breakfast for the homeless, and how these tiny actions can make a big difference. Wherever good has won, and we have done what God wants, we help God's Kingdom of love grow.

We thought about how just a smile at someone can sometimes make all the difference to that person and how they're feeling; we watched the Pig of Happiness by Edward Moncton https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=uoilYlww8M4


We read from Matthew 17 verse 20, where Jesus tells us that all we need is a mustard seed of faith and we can move mountains; we the sung the Mustard Seed song and City on a Hill (Let Your Light Shine). We then ate seedy flapjack snacks






We filled cups with soil to grow giant sunflowers, created a JAM family tree collage, with the phrase at the bottom "Helping God's Kingdom Grow"

JAMMY News 9th March – Community Breakfast

What an amazing morning! we arrived before 9am to get ready to serve 2 sittings of people from the church and community with a cooked breakfast.

The members of JAM were kept very busy firstly getting people seated, then taking their orders and providing everyone with a lovely full English breakfast served with toast and juice.



Our "customers" were all delighted with the service they received from the children of JAM as well as the food and drink provided.

We want to thank the amazing team of adult helpers who worked so very hard in the kitchen to provide the food to order and fresh tea and coffee.



At around 10:45, after the 2 sittings were completed, the JAM members and along with our exhausted helpers sat down and had their own breakfast – a well-earned rest and meal.





By the end of it we had served over 50 meals and raised an amazing £415 for YMCA's Sleep Easy Appeal which is in support of homeless young people in Norfolk, of which there are over 330!

Chris also spent a night rough-sleeping with the YMCA, gathering sponsors before and after the event, which raised over £1,070.



This is the shelter that Chris slept in, some bits of cardboard put together.

He was safe in a compound with 35 other fund-raisers, unlike young people who sleep rough in shop doorways.

We thank all who supported the Community Breakfast and/or sponsored Chris for his sleep-out.



Each year YMCA Norfolk joins YMCAs from across England and Wales to take part in a mammoth Sleep Easy fundraising event with the aim of raising vital funds to help tackle the root causes of youth homelessness.

Our Eco Church...

Our recycling this year is being funded by a grant from Veolia.

What does Veolia do? Veolia UK is part of a worldwide Group of companies, with over 163 000 employees worldwide, the Group designs and provides water, waste and energy management solutions that contribute to the sustainable development of communities and industries.







What happens to the medicine blister packs we recycle with TerraCycle?

- TerraCycle partners with various retailers and organizations collect empty medicine blister packs.
- TerraCycle has already collected and recycled 75 million blister packs from hundreds of locations across the country.
- Blister packs are heat-sealed together. The combination of materials used to make blister packs and the heat-sealing means separating and recycle them is difficult and expensive. For this reason, many councils don't recycle pill packets as it's too costly.

Separation:

The collected blister packs are cleaned, and the plastic and aluminium foil components are separated using a specialised machine and converts all the waste into something new.

Recycling:

- The <u>aluminium foil</u> is recycled using conventional methods (aluminium is infinitely recyclable!).
- New products:
- The <u>plastic</u> is processed into a usable form, such as granules or flakes, which can be used to create new products such as window frames or piping.
- Some recycled plastic is also used to create a material called MyBoardTM. Nothing goes to landfill and nothing is incinerated.
- MyBoardTM is used to make a variety of things. It can be used to replace plywood in items like indoor and outside furniture, garden planters, shop fittings, children's playgrounds, plastic waste bins and other items.

Please remember to contribute approximately £2 into the box on our recycling unit each time you use this service. This will help to pay for this expensive recycling service provided at The Hub.

Encounter with Pope Francis called an "honour" on pilgrimage to Rome

In mid-January, the Revd Lythan Nevard, Moderator of the United Reformed Church Eastern Synod, formed part of an ecumenical pilgrimage to Rome with church leaders from Norfolk and Waveney.

Here, Lythan reflects on the trip:

I was privileged to join church leaders of Norfolk and Waveney. We were Baptist, URC, Quaker, Catholic and Anglican. It turned out to be an advantage to travel with Catholic and Anglican Bishops as we were able to experience all sorts of things that URC folk usually do not.

We stayed in the Venerable English College and had a glimpse of what training for Catholic priesthood is like. I'm not a morning person but found the discipline of 6:45am prayer followed by mass an integral part of the experience, though it has not come home with me.

We shared communion at the Anglican Centre and met the ecumenical liaison officers of the Methodist, Anglican and Reformed Churches. We visited two of the dicastries, administrative departments, of the Holy See for Christian Unity and for Promoting the Integrity of Human Development. The latter has a focus on listening to the needs of parishes across the world, reflecting on the issues and seeing what gifts and resources can be offered and what partnerships, including ecumenical and governmental can be created. I appreciated, as I have not before, the sense of being part of the global church that came from these conversations.

We visited the Basilica of St Paul's Outside the Wall and were guided round by the former abbot who included stories probably not on the usual tour! And we were the first group to visit the Scavi – the necropolis excavated under St Peter's Basilica following a long closure for redevelopment. We were able to glimpse what might just be the bones of St Peter and had a real sense of Church history all around us.



On the Wednesday we were part of the regular audience with Pope Francis but were able to skip the queue, Bishops are the best accessory and were surprised to be given front row seats. There was a palpable air of excitement and joy. Greetings, the Bible reading and a short summary of the Pope's reflection on it were read out in eight languages. We were entertained by a circus

troupe celebrating the Pope's current focus on children. Then without warning our group were ushered up the steps to greet Pope Francis. It was an amazing honour, albeit one that lasted about 20 seconds. We were each given a bronze papal medal – now a prized possession. if you want to see it I will probably be carrying it around for a while!. There was something very special about thousands of people worshipping God and celebrating their faith together.



Just as treasured as my medal though, is a conversation in the college chapel before breakfast between me, my Baptist colleague and a Catholic tutor about ministry where we shared appreciation of each other's ministerial formation and how we express our faith in Jesus. It gave me hope, in this Catholic Jubilee Year of Hope that Jesus' prayer "that they may all be one" may actually be fulfilled.
